

After you write your paper, you must include a Works Cited page that lists your reference materials and sources. Make sure to arrange items in alphabetical order by the last name of the author. If no author is given, use the first word of the title. Do not include A, An, and The. If an entry is more than one line, indent the following lines 5 spaces from the left margin. Make sure to double space.



1. A Book or Pamphlet with an Author

Format: Last name, First name. Title. City of publication: Publisher, year. Medium of publication.

Example: Durrett, Deanne. *Unsung Heroes of World War II: The Story of the Navajo Code Talkers*. New York: Facts on File, 1998. Print.

2. A Book or Pamphlet with an Editor

Format: Follow name with a comma and ed. Then continue entry as above.

Example: Miller, Jonathan, ed. The Body in Question. New York: Random, 1982. Print.

3. An Article/Essay/specific work in an Anthology or Reference Book

Format: Author of specific work- last name first. "Title of Specific Work." *Title of Anthology or Reference Book.* Ed. name of editor. Volume # if applicable. City: Publisher, Date. Page numbers of article. Medium of Publication.

Example: Holladay, Hillary. "Ann Petry." *Twentieth-Century Literary Criticism*. Ed. Linda Pavlovski. Vol. 112. Detroit: Gale, 2002. 356-62. Print.

4. An Article/Essay/specific work in an Anthology or Reference Book accessed through an Online Database Format: Author of specific work- last name first. "Title of Specific Work." *Title of Anthology or Reference*

Book. Ed. name of editor. City: Publisher, Date. Name of Database. Medium of Publication. Date of access.

Example: Hume, Mick. "Experimentation on Nonhuman Primates is Vital to Medicine." *At Issue: Animal Experimentation.* San Diego: Greenhaven, 2004. *Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center.* Web. 1 Sept. 2009.

5. Image, Graphic, or Photo Found on a Website (rather than a book or other location)

Format: Artist's Last Name, First Name. <u>Title of Image</u>. Year created. Institution/Museum/Gallery, City. Name of website. Web. Day Month Year of access URL.

Example: Van Gogh, Vincent. <u>The Starry Night</u>. 1889. Museum of Modern Art, New York. Web. 16 Oct. 2009 http://www.moma.org/collection/Browse result.php?object_id=78902.

6. An Article from a Magazine or Journal

Format: Author's last name, first name. "Title of Article." *Name of Magazine* Day Month Year: page number(s). Medium of Publication.

Example: Belgey, Sharon. "A Healthy Dose of Laughter." Newsweek 4 Oct. 1982: 74-8. Print.

7. An Article from a Magazine or Journal accessed through an Online Subscription or Database

Format: Author's last name, first name. "Title of Article." *Name of Magazine* Date: page number(s). *Name of Database*. Medium of Publication. Day Month Year. <URL of database homepage>.

Example: Mone, Gregory. "Tsunami in a Tank." *Popular Science* Oct. 2007: 30. *Student Resource Center Bronze*. Web. 27 Aug. 2009. http://find.galegroup.com>.

8. An Article from a Professional Website

Format: Author (if known) Last name, first name. "Title of Article." *Web Site Title*. Publisher or Sponsor of the Web Site, Date of publication or last update. Medium of Publication. Date of access. <specific URL of article>.

Example: Fortin, Judy. "Avoid School Strain: Unstuff that Backpack." *CNN.com.* Cable News Network, 10 Sept. 2007. Web. 2 Sept.2009. http://www.cnn.com/2007/HEALTH/conditions/09/10/hm.backpack.pain/index.html.

9. A Personal Interview

Format: Last Name, First Name of person interviewed. Type of interview (For example, Personal, Telephone, or E-mail interview). Date of interview.

Examples: Pei, I. M. Personal interview. 22 Dec. 1993.

Williams, James. E-mail interview. 15 Oct. 2006.
